Shara Golden's Report on the 62nd Session of the UN Commission on the Status of Women

What a privilege to receive an invitation to attend the 62nd Session of the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women (UNCSW62) on behalf of the membership of the worldwide Mothers' Union! The priority theme for this session was: "Challenges and opportunities in achieving gender equality and the empowerment of rural women and girls".

When I thought of what was ahead of us, I knew there would be scripture to support God's plan for women and girls who are marginalized in their homes, their communities, and their countries. Zechariah 7:9 (NIV): "This is what the Lord Almighty says: 'Administer true justice; show mercy and compassion to one another'". As MU members, we were both called to and equipped for the task.

I arrived at the airport for a 7am flight on Saturday, March 10th but it was delayed until 2pm because of an emergency landing by a plane that had caught fire. In Montreal, they rushed me through security to catch my NY flight but the Information Board at the gate read cancelled! Once again, connections were made for me and I finally arrived at my hotel sometime after 10pm.

On Sunday, March 11, we were directed to the nearest Anglican Communion Church. I attended Saint Albans, the First Reformed Episcopal Church, founded in 1874. It was almost a little "hole in the wall". They invited me to their coffee hour which included a Lenten Bible study. They were dear people

who made me feel so welcome. Their average Sunday attendance is around 25. Doesn't that sound kind of "rural" in the middle of one of the biggest "urban" cities in the world?

Our Mothers' Union group met at 3pm the same day to get our UN Passes. There were huge lines and long waits at each pass point. Our delegation included: Ekua Swanzy, Ghana; Felicia Yeboah Asuamah, Ghana; Beverly Jullien, Chief Executive, Worldwide MU; and Rachael Anderson, Events and Digital Communications Manager, Worldwide MU. Annie Beckley, United States, was unable to attend due to the death of her infant grandchild. Leah Chipepa, Zambia, didn't arrive until Tuesday as she missed her

connection in Johannesburg. She was my roommate for the rest of the week and we both knew that God had chosen us to be there for each other.

So what was this week at the UN all about? Because MU is a non-governmental organization (NGO) and has achieved status to attend and make written representation to UNCSW, our International MU invites Provinces to submit the name of a member, together with an application, to attend as a delegate. What an honour to be chosen to be a part of this group!

What is the UNCSW? It is the principal global intergovernmental body exclusively dedicated to the promotion of gender equality and the empowerment

of women. It was established on June 21, 1946 and has been instrumental in promoting women's rights, documenting the reality of women's lives throughout the world, and shaping global standards on gender equality and the empowerment of women. Our responsibilities were to attend sessions, listen carefully, and provide daily observations to our MU delegation.

The December 7, 2017 Statement was submitted by MU as an NGO in consultative status with the Economic and Social Council. The opening paragraph reads: **"Mothers' Union is an international grassroots membership movement, rooted in the Anglican Church, with over 4 million members in 83 countries around the world. Mothers' Union seeks to transform communities, and the lives of families, women and men, through practical support, empowerment, and by challenging systems which perpetuate injustice at the local, national and international level. We work to support family life, empower women, combat gender inequality and gender based violence, and promote the participation and representation of women in decision making"**.

On Monday, March 12th, Felicia and I were invited to the Anglican Communion Offices to be filmed for our thoughts on MU's participation as UNCSW62

delegates. I didn't look forward to doing it but Rachael, my beloved leader, walked me through it. I was encouraged by her words: "Just brilliant!" We met at the Anglican Communion Chapel to watch the opening of this UN session on a huge screen, followed by the opening Eucharist for the UNCSW62. The Most Reverend Michael B. Curry, Presiding Bishop and Primate of the Episcopal Church, was our Celebrant and Preacher. He gave a holy and exciting liturgy at a beautiful and spirit-filled Eucharist.

We received an orientation session on UNCSW processes from the Reverend Deacon Carey Connors, which was a very helpful start. As we left to go to the UN, we received a "Welcome to the UNCSW62 – A Snack just for you!" bag which was given to us by the National Episcopal Church Women Board. It included several snacks and useful purse-sized items.

From that point onward, our days were packed. We had choice of up to 40 sessions a day. Each session ran for approximately 1.5 to 2 hours, and involved a completely new group of delegates each time. We were literally running from session to session just to get a seat. If one was not available, the

next closest venue was chosen if that topic was still open to delegates. I usually attended 4-5 sessions each day, wrapping up around 8pm.

We regrouped each evening in the common room of the Hotel 50 Affini to discuss our day. Leah Chipepa was our writer for the week and Rachael Anderson took on that task until she arrived. This was Leah's fourth time attending the UNCSW so she was a great source of information and a talented writer for MU. The rest of us shared input from our day as, for the most part, we each attended different sessions.

We all had breakfast together on Friday, March 16th, saying goodbye to Beverly Jullien, who was flying back to England. Rachael also left us to spend time with her husband in New York. We finished the day by attending our final sessions.

Some of the sessions that I attended on behalf of all of you, my beloved MU Sisters in Christ, were:

1. Transformative Approaches to Achieve Women's Security at Scale: The Relation between Equal Land Rights & Women's Empowerment in Rural Africa;
2. Making the Case for a Legally Binding Treaty to Eliminate Violence Against Women and Girls; Dealing with Women's Strife;
3. Life as a Trafficked Woman: A Story Told (Mely Lenario);
4. Restored – What You Can Do to End Violence Against Women;
5. Ending Child Marriage (At Risk Adolescent Girls Aged 10-17);
6. National Alliance of Women's Organisations (NAWO): Child Widows and

Young Widows;

7. Challenges of Women's Emancipation in Rural Areas: When the Culture is Violence;

8. Women in Building Sustainable Peace: Empowering Rural Women to Build Values of Peace Through Their Role in the Family;

9. Bending the Curve: Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) Trends We Aim to Change;

10. Rural Women Resisting Land Grabs in Uganda; Transformative Approaches to Achieve Women's Tenure Security at Scale: The Relation between Equal Land Rights and Women's Empowerment in Rural Africa.

We cannot resolve all the issues presented at UNCSW62, but we, as members of the Canadian Mothers' Union, can stand in solidarity by taking on at least one of their affirmative actions. I believe that our Parenting Program teaches the basics to positively empower men to take on their positions of responsibility in the home with their wives, their children, and their com-

munity, as God designed from the very beginning. Many countries are working with this approach to raise their little boys. Culture, civil and criminal law, tradition and various faith communities have wrenched men away from their abilities to be both real men and leaders. War steals men from their families often resulting in widows as young as 9 years old. Losing fathers and husbands leaves young women and children with no protection and nowhere to live. Civil war has turned many men into rebels without a conscience.

We need to be the voice of women living in rural areas. I believe each Canadian province may very well have had women attending these meetings who were from leadership positions in churches, unions, government, other NGOs, etc. We have to partner with them in order to make changes in Canada. Together, we can stand in solidarity with other women in the world, to show that we have indeed heard their voices.

I want to thank the Canadian MU, our Canadian Council, and the

Fredericton Diocesan MU Council for supporting me. Being chosen by the Worldwide Mothers' Union to attend UNCSW62 was an honour that I will cherish for the rest of my life.

God's word in Isaiah 54:10 (NIV): "Though the mountains be shaken and the hills be removed, yet my unfailing love for you will not be shaken nor my covenant of peace be removed," says the Lord, who has compassion on you.

This has meaning for all of us, especially for those women and girls who are waiting for someone to come "alongside" and be God's hands of compassion in this weary and broken world. That means you and me. We are stronger because we are standing together as Mothers' Union members. We are "Christians united in prayer, worship and service, to promote conditions in society favourable to stable family life and the protection of children, and to help those whose family life has met with adversity". Let's get moving!

MU in Thunder Bay Supports Family Giving Centre

The parish of St. Thomas in Thunder Bay has an amazing community outreach program called the Family Giving Centre (FGC). We began thirty years ago as a small food cupboard helping about twenty-five families in our neighbourhood. Bags of food were given out two Friday mornings each month.

In the past eight years, inspired by the increasing need in our community, we have changed and grown. Now we provide food twice each month to as many as 150 people, repre-

sending singles, couples, and families. To meet other needs of our clients we also have rooms of ladies', men's, and children's clothing, toys, two rooms of housewares, and pet supplies. Many of our clients are single older folks living in difficult circumstances and are too often lonely. A hot lunch is available to anyone wishing to stay and enjoy some good food and fellowship. This gives our clients an opportunity to visit with each other, chat with the volunteers or speak to our clergy. We have volunteers from

teenagers to those in their nineties and it takes at least 20 eager and willing people to help each time we are open.

There are so many tasks that need to be done before and during each food cupboard and a large number of these are handled by MU members. We help with sorting donations, office work including accounting and ordering groceries, preparing bags of food to be given out, re-bagging bulk food items, and shopping for food. We organize clothing rooms and the pet room.

Members make desserts and help serve the lunch.

Several times a year the FGC has fund raising events where most Mothers' Union members generously give their time to raise money and collect food donations.

The FGC is a parish mission that is strongly supported by our members and as the coordinator I can assure you that Mothers' Union is a necessary and integral part of the outreach work we do.

Canada Hosts Second Zone B MULO A Meeting

MULO A - Mothers' Union Listening, Observing, Acting

Thirty women from Zone B — South America, Central America, the Caribbean and North America — met at Villa Madonna in Rothesay, NB, April 17-20 to devise a plan for future growth.

Attending were MU representatives from Northern Argentina, Peru, Barbados, Guyana, Jamaica & the Cayman Islands, Trinidad & Tobago, NECA (North Eastern Caribbean & Aruba), the Windward Islands, the United States and Canada. One member each from South Korea, Australia and MelanAsia attended as observers. Canadians included MU members from the Diocese of Fredericton and the Diocese of Nova Scotia & Prince Edward Island. Two translators for the South American delegation also attended.

A vicious snow and freezing rain storm in Toronto prevented several delegates from arriving on time, but on arrival, each was comforted by a bag of handmade items, including gloves, touques and socks, plus snacks. As well, St. John the Baptist Church in Riverview kindly made a prayer shawl for each woman, and many delegates were seen

wearing them during the chilly week in Rothesay.

For the past several months, Zone B membership has been asking the MULO A questions with help from their churches and partners outside the church. "We held meetings in each area to ask people at the grassroots — church people, clergy, Mothers' Union members, men's guilds, the youth arm of the church and people in the wider community like school teachers," said Sheran Harper, a Zone B trustee who lives in Guyana.

"It went very well. In Guyana, the clergy were particularly interested," she said. In fact, their bishop was so impressed with the method that he has asked for the process to be rolled out in parishes so they can set up their own visioning framework. "He saw it as a way to strengthen parishes, increase growth in parishes," she said. "We got very excited when he said he'd like it in every parish."

During the Rothesay meeting, the goal was to share the answers to the MULO A questions as a way to better chart the course for the future. "This is a follow-up meeting to bring back all the information we've gotten from the last six months, sharing it and using it to move forward," said Kathleen Snow, a facilitator and trainer with MU who is also the parish nurse at Christ Church Cathedral.

"It's certainly covered with prayer, and many activities are biblically based."

Canadian (provincial) president Alice Kennedy (Parish of Hampton), was happy with the progress made during the week. "The process is a unique perspective on strategic planning," she said. "It combines your faith and listening to assess needs. It's forward-thinking and developed to meet the needs down the road and see how we are going to grow."

Alice found the whole process a bit overwhelming when MULO A was first introduced. "But because it's a worldwide movement, you hear the stories, and that energizes me," she said. "We live in a developed country. I have water every day. When I hear the stories of other women, I realize we could be doing more."

Kathleen was also pleased with the way the week went. "It's been amazing," she said. "One woman from Peru said this whole process has changed her life. It's given the women a voice, strength. We've had some really good stories. They're all women of deep faith."

Alice and Lilian Ketch organized the gathering, which ended a day before the annual MU rally on Saturday, April 21 in Sussex. Seventeen of the delegates attended, and between Hampton and Sussex, 17 billets were found to allow them to stay and enjoy the rally.

This is the third visit to Canada for Sheran Harper, of Guyana. She sums up her experiences here: "Canada Mothers' Union for me is a role model for other provinces. They share unselfishly; they use their professional skills from their jobs and bring it to Mothers' Union in such a way. One example that pops out for me is IT — the technology. Canadian Mothers' Union is way advanced in that area. Canadian Mothers' Union members have a way of sharing and treating their sisters from other countries in the same way they would like to be treated. Canada is an amazing place for me. I call this my home!"
