

Over 3,000 Mothers' Union members from around the world gathered to join the 140th Anniversary celebrations. Two services were held in Winchester Cathedral, with Bishop Nigel Stock preaching in the morning, and Justin Welby, Archbishop of Canterbury, in the afternoon. The General Meeting was held in Basingstoke the following day.

Our Canadian President, Margaret DeCarvalho, was able to attend. Along with a message of congratulations, she took a gift of maple syrup to carry in the procession into the cathedral.

The organization that Mary Sumner started in 1876 as a small parish-based support group has grown to the current Mothers' Union as we know it, with more than 4 million members in over 80 countries. Queen Elizabeth II, one of our patrons, wished continuing success in giving hope and strength to so many.

In our work to support women, bring positive change to society, work for women's rights and gender equality, and campaigning against violence against women and girls, the Mothers' Union helps to change the lives of over half a million people every year. Chief Executive Bev Jullien encouraged members to reach twice as many beneficiaries, with the goal of assisting 1 million people annually by 2021.

Parenting Facilitators' Training in Parenting Facilitators' Training in Halifax in April 2016

Canadian Mothers' Union is delighted to report that a very successful Parenting Facilitators' Training took place April 21 – 24th, 2016. Eight participants from four parishes in Nova Scotia, gathered at St. Margaret's Church in the Parish of French Village for four full, intense, but fun and laughter-filled days of training under our two Canadian trainers, Kathleen Snow and Celia Dodds.

After two years of promotion and advertising, which included explaining to Canadian Council what the parenting program was all about and who would be eligible to become facilitators, a Steering Committee was formed in April 2015, whose job it was to suggest possible candidates. Several names were put forward and all expressed interest in taking the Facilitators' Training. However, finding a time when all would be available to attend proved more difficult, since it meant taking time off work as it extended over four days. Two attempts to hold the training in September and October 2015 were aborted because we could not meet the minimal number of eight participants. Finally, a time in April 2016, after Easter, spanning two weekdays and one weekend was decided upon and we got eight registrants.

As this was our first training Kathleen and I were very excited but quite nervous, but we couldn't have asked for a more talented, enthusiastic, already skillful group of people to work with and they succeeded beyond all our expectations. The training contains twelve very interactive sessions including a large number of ice-breakers and energizers, all of which play an important part in the formation of a parenting group. They learned how to make parents feel comfortable, how to monitor and guide discussions using appropriate interventions, without appearing to control the group. They became aware when to keep silent and listen, how to observe individuals to pick up on hidden agendas, and how to cope with disagreements or even potential aggression. Each participant practiced being the facilitator in a real discussion with a controversial question. (e.g. Should young children have cell phones?), where five were in the group and two were observers. The members in the class were encouraged to behave like real parents might and try to throw the facilitator off her guard. You can imagine the fun they had with that one. The last session was the day of practicums, when each prepared a fifteen minute segment of a session with a good beginning and satisfactory ending. Each new facilitator received a certificate of participation, the Canadian Parenting Resource Manual and suggestions for preparing for a parenting course in their own parish within six months.

We are indebted to Mary Stone who organized the whole training from contacting the candidates, arranging for their billets, the venue, the arranging of meals on site and provision of materials for the course. We are most grateful to Mothers' Union members who supplied us with delicious meals and snacks, and to St. Margaret's Church for allowing us to use their premises, especially their heat and water. We thank Nova Scotia for the beautiful sunny, brisk weather we enjoyed throughout the four days.

Branch members in the areas where a course is being held please support your new facilitators in any way you can – advertising the course, canvassing for participants, providing child care, observing and assisting in the sessions, supplying tea and refreshments and of course prayer.

When the new Canadian Council takes over in 2017 Maxine Simpkin will be the new Parenting Program Coordinator. Kathleen and I will continue as trainers.

With God's Grace

Isabel Cutler is a Mothers' Union member in the Diocese of Fredericton, Christ Church Cathedral branch. She recently provided a Lenten reflection titled "The challenge is to be me, with God's grace – an ongoing life adventure" and this was shared with the New Brunswick Anglican.

Isabel Cutler is 69, and newly retired after 50 years of nursing. Her final assignment, for the past 10 years, has been as the parish nurse at Christ Church Cathedral. "The last part of my career was definitely the icing on the cake for me," she said. She is a wife, mother and grandmother, and recently diagnosed with a chronic disease that requires daily medication. Now, she told her audience, she has to do what she's pleaded with patients to do throughout her career — take her medication!

Born in Yorkshire, England, Isabel was raised in Great Yarmouth, Norfolk. An only child, she always lived in a hospital setting, because her mother was an assistant matron and her father taught nurses' training. "It was a wonderful sense of community even though I didn't have siblings," she said. She told of the Scottish fishermen and their wives who would come to Norfolk to fish each year. The crowd would come to Isabel's home for prayer meetings, sharing their faith and their stories, while her mother and father served tea and sandwiches. "It was a real Christian community, even though I didn't realize what it was at the time," she said. Isabel went to boarding school at age 10, and when she finished her education she was absolutely sure of what she did not want to do. "I said I was never, never, never going to be a nurse," she said. "But all of a sudden, I changed my mind." Her mother sent her to St. George's Hospital in London for initial training, after which she chose midwifery and public health on which to focus. She was sent to Walton on Thames in Surrey for training in public health services to the poor of the community. In the town there was a couple with a new baby who had been born at home without any medical intervention whatsoever. The parents had refused to let anyone in their house, least of all anyone official. For whatever reason, it fell to Isabel to visit them as a public health nurse. Nervous and afraid as she approached the house, she prayed for guidance. What she found inside was a desperate couple needing help but afraid authorities would take their 6-month-old child, who had multiple disabilities. Isabel reassured them and gave them the help they needed.

Two years later, looking for adventure, Isabel applied for a new job. That brought her to the International Grenfell Association in St. Anthony, Newfoundland & Labrador. Her arrival was a real foretaste of the adventures to come. She was a passenger in a six-seater plane that skidded sideways down the runway before stopping at the terminal — a Nissen hut. "I was the public health nurse for the whole peninsula area," she said, adding she used snowmobiles, boats and a Jeep to get around.

While in Newfoundland, she met the man she still calls the love of her life, Nathan Cutler. He was a student at Memorial University who eventually became an educational psychologist. They married the day after he graduated with a bachelor's degree. Working in various places in Newfoundland and eventually in New Brunswick, she was blessed with communities that welcomed her and demonstrated their great care of people and faith in God. In New Brunswick in the 1990s, she and Nathan began a business developing software to help special needs children. Isabel worked at both the hospital and the business. Throughout their careers and married lives, both Isabel and Nathan felt great stirrings to investigate further ministry — even the priesthood. Both were accepted by ACPO (Advisory Committee on Postulants for Ordination) at various points in their lives. Isabel even began studies at Atlantic School of Theology. Neither, however, pursued it, feeling it was not right for them, and have found other ways to serve God. "Parish nursing at the Cathedral has been a blessing for me," she said. "It's the joy of collegiality, not just with the parish nursing team, but with the congregation too. We've had a lot of support and care from a lot of people." (Cont'd. p. 6)

Finally retired, Isabel devotes herself to her family, including her grandchildren. One recent bonus has been finding her half-sister, whose birth was the result of her father's lapse when Isabel was a teenager. Her sister is German. Not long ago, Isabel typed her sister's name into Facebook, found a woman with that name, sent a private message and got a prompt and positive reply. Her sister was living in Saskatchewan at the time but has since moved to Spain. They have talked on the phone. Isabel ended her reflection with an excerpt from the book, "In Age Reborn" by Sister Thelma Ann SSJD ... "Each of us walks a pathway through life and that pathway is unique. If I do not walk it in a way that makes me a channel of

grace, no one ever will. My particular track, traced through my life events, my relationships, my unique mix of gifts and weaknesses... is becoming a channel of God's redeeming love, if I am willing to live through, with and in God.

Jean Lillian Brockhurst January 4th, 1939 - February 17th, 2016


