The Rev. Canon Tom Stradwick had never heard of Mothers' Union until a few years ago, when a cheque for \$900 arrived in the mail. It was from the Mothers' Union, part of their Northern Clergy Family Fund initiative, and the Stradwicks were grateful.

Perhaps this is Tom's way to repay that generosity. On Saturday, April 29, as part of the diocesan Mothers' Union annual rally, he was commissioned as chaplain of Mothers' Union in Canada. The rally took place at St. John the Baptist Anglican Church in Riverview. About 85 members and guests attended.

Several others were commissioned as members of both the diocesan and Canadian Mothers' Union councils. Bishop David Edwards led the commissioning, which included Joanne Ham as the incoming diocesan president. The day began with the commissioning during the Service of Holy Eucharist, where Tom preached on Matthew 14:22-33, which was read by the Rev. Caleb Twinmatsiko, headmaster of Bishop McAllister College in Uganda. The story is of Peter's ill-fated walk on water.

"Peter's eyes were on Jesus and it was all going great," said Tom. "But when he took his eyes off Jesus he started to sink.

He started going down."

How does this relate to our lives, he asked? We're in the boat of life, floating across the sea, discerning what God wants us to be.

"We are not called to stay in the boat," said Tom. "We're called to be on the water, to take risks, to venture out.

"If we keep our eyes on the Lord, we'll be fine. We'll be more than fine," he said. "We'll do amazing work to further God's reign."

The offering of \$570 was split between the Northern Clergy Family Fund and the two diocesan camps, Brookwood and Medley.

Margie Milner introduced guest speaker Nancy Hartling, a new senator who lives in Riverview. She applied to be a senator under new rules last year, and in October, got a surprise call from

Prime Minister Justin Trudeau asking for permission to forward her name to the Governor General for recommendation as a new senator.

Many years ago, Nancy was a single parent looking for resources and ended up creating Support to Single Parents, an agency she led for more than 30 years. She has earned many awards and accolades over the years for her dedicated advocacy for women.

She described how she came to be a senator and what she's experienced in her first six months in Ottawa. When she was told she had not been spending all the money allotted to her office, her response was, "but I come from the non-profit world!"

She has chosen to focus on two areas as a senator: human rights and social affairs.

Her advice to Mothers' Union members was to keep up with the current trends in society. For example, our one-child families are the norm now, but refugees coming into the community often have four or more children and they will need strong family support.

"I'm very pleased your group does so much for children," she said.

The other guest speaker was Hope Twinmatsiko, who, with a Masters in psychology, is a lecturer at Kampala University. She is the mother of two teenagers and is married to the Rev. Caleb.

"I am a very, very active member of Mothers' Union," she said. "My mother was a Mothers' Union member. She was a very encouraging mom and I love her for that."

Mothers' Union began in Uganda in 1908 and has become "everything" to the Ugandan church, she said. They clean the church, cook, organize and lead many events and groups. They make clothing, knit and teach people to sew. They mentor young woman about to get married, support wives of clergy, and teach parenting skills.

She talked about the issues of mental health, abuse and drug and alcohol addictions, things she deals with at work and in her community. Girls, she said, especially need guidance, and it is Mothers' Union that often gives that guidance.

"We encourage stable families," she said. "We walk together, pray together, offer encouragement to families facing challenges." She has voluntarily mentored many girls over the years, because, she said, "I am a Mothers' Union member."

The day ended with the group splitting into several breakout groups to discuss the day's speakers, Tom Stradwick, Nancy Hartling and Hope Twinmatsiko, and how they, as Mothers' Union members, can mobilize in outreach and ministry for the benefit of others.

Joanne Ham was pleased with how the day unfolded.

"Overall, I was thrilled. I felt it was full of energy and promise. It may sound a bit corny, but I was most pleased by the Mothers' Union members themselves," she said. "These are wonderfully giving women, and yes, a few men. I feel very blessed to be a part of the Mothers' Union together with them.

"My favourite part of the rally was very simple. It was the beginning of the church service when the Mothers' Union banners were being paraded into the church with all of our members joyfully singing 'Lift High the Cross.' As a Mothers' Union member, that is a powerful moment, you truly feel a part of something special."

She hopes for three points to remain with members.

"The first is that they became inspired with renewed energy to continue the work of the Mothers' Union in their churches and communities.

"Secondly, that they felt the community and support that comes with being a member of Mothers' Union.

"Finally, a sense of pride in being part of a larger organization which upholds and works towards such important objectives. I know that when I went home from the rally I felt, well tired, but I also felt each of these things."

National Gathering of Anglican Women Ancaster, Ontario, June 15-18, 2017

I arrived in Ancaster during the early morning hours of June 15th. Well, 7:00 am is early for me! I was greeted by Marion Saunders, Convenor and Host, who delivered me straight to the registration desk and then helped me to find my room. Our dorm sat in the middle of a beautiful tree-shaded area at Redeemer University College, just a two minute walk from the main building.

The event was opened by our Primate, Archbishop Fred Hiltz, who provided a full hour of information on the status of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission. He spoke about the role of our many Anglican people who give their time and talents around the world, and of our relationship with the Cuban and Jerusalem churches. He will meet with the Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, in December and former Archbishop Rowan Williams will be in attendance. At this time he will be briefed on the status of the Anglican Communion and he will put forward his questions about how we are to proceed with our open and transparent Canadian walk with this world body.

The Primate also addressed the tragedy of human trafficking. He spoke of thirteen to fifteen year old girls being the most vulnerable in this heinous business and raised the issue of partnerships as the way to combat this crime. We need to break the misrepresentation that women and children are commodities to be bought and sold. Together we can work towards bringing these victims away from the grasp of the enemy and back to lives of dignity and worth.

We also heard a heart rending presentation from Suzanne Rumsey, Public Engagement Officer of the Primate's World Relief and Development Fund (PWRDF). She spoke of our Canadian Anglican challenging response to the world through our Food Security Campaign. PWRDF is also working to save the lives of mothers and babies through better maternity housing, vaccinations and the training of nurses to help mothers in their communities with birthing and raising their children. Bangladesh and Tanzania in particular have benefited from PWRDF's programs in Maternal, Newborn and Child Health. follow the Cross of Christ. When we started our walk, did we consider where we might be ten years down the road? Where did we end up and how did we get there? She advised that we "do something so that we can accomplish something to make a difference and show that we care". Following her talk, we were treated to a performance by the Liturgical Dance Group directed by

Allison Wright.

During the morning of June 17th, I gave a talk about Mothers' Union to fifteen participants. I was there an hour beforehand and did not have a working computer and overhead projector until about three minutes to my start time. Alice Kennedy had prepared the presentation which I was able to use. I got quite a few laughs introducing Alice as the jumpstick in

We also heard an interesting presentation entitled "The Mohawk Journey" which provided the history of the Mohawk people starting as early as 1609. Also, The Anglican Foundation honoured the ACW and its trust fund for Women in Ministry now and in the future.

We heard a presentation by Deborah Lonergan-Freakegave on the Council of the North whose work began in 1970. There are nine financially assisted dioceses in the North which receive \$1.8 million from General Synod to be divided among them. They cover 85% of the geography of the Anglican Church of Canada.

Our Keynote Speaker, Ann Veyvara-Divinski, described more than 50 Years of Women's Ministry. She asked us to consider where are we going when we my hand. Alice had done a lovely video of greetings which was well received by all. The one suggestion from the group was that we need to update our website. Several of the women are Mothers' Union members who have not attended meetings in a very long time. When they checked out our site they were disappointed that they were unable to find the information that they wanted.

In all, I believe we made a wonderful connection with the women at the ACW national gathering. I found that we have a lot in common, especially surrounding the care of women and families in the world. I can see that the ACW and the Canadian Mothers' Union could form a future partnership in this mutual area of our service.

Worldwide Mothers' Union Reps Meet in Ireland

It would be a vast understatement to say that Kathleen Snow is fond of Mothers' Union.

"It's not a group I belong to," she said. "It's a way of life. A lot of my faith I attribute to Mothers' Union — the rallies, meetings, relationships with other members."

Kathleen has been a member of the Christ Church Cathedral branch since it began in 1988, although it was created in Britain in 1876. Her bond with the group is such that she has been diocesan president, the Canadian president, and now, a representative member for all zones outside Britain and Ireland.

She recently travelled to Ireland for its annual worldwide council along with provincial (Canadian) president Alice Kennedy of Hampton, and came back revived by the experience.

"There were more than 100 women from all over the world there," she said.

Their focus was on constitutional changes needed "to streamline who would be on the board and to reflect our globalized membership," said Kathleen. "We're getting rid of representative

members, so I voted myself out of a position."

Those changes will eventually go to Britian's Privy Council because of its royal charter. HRH Queen Elizabeth is the patron of Mothers' Union.

Mothers' Union had a strong presence in Canada before an executive decision meant the ACW would be the

only women's group of the Anglican Church of Canada. But in 1974, Elspeth Newton led an effort to re-establish Mothers' Union in this country.

While it has a mere 700 Canadian members, it is huge in the UK and growing throughout the world, with four million members in 80 countries. Africa and Indonesia in particular are seeing strong growth.

"In the UK it's the main women's group in the Anglican Church," said Kathleen. "Here in Canada it's the ACW, with their fundraising focus and generous support for missions. But the Mothers Union does not have that same focus."

The largest Canadian membership for Mothers' Union is in the Dioceses of Nova Scotia & P.E.I. and Fredericton, with smaller groups across the country. This diocese has 120 members.

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The focus of Mothers' Union has always been on encouraging and nurturing healthy Christian families. They do that with various programs, including a literacy program that is of great value in Africa, for example.

"We teach women how to read, write and do math," said Kathleen, to help in the creation of small businesses run by women.

They also run family life programs that examine relationships, and a parenting program, for which Kathleen is a facilitator.

"It's a group of parents who get together to discuss experiences and learn from one another what works and what doesn't," she said.

While the Mothers' Union focus is definitely on family, membership is not limited to mothers, Anglicans or even women.

As with so many western organizations, declining membership is a challenge. There is a struggle to make the group relevant in the 21st century, and that has led to innovative means of attracting members.

"Some Mothers' Unions meet in coffee shops," she said. "There's a Mothers' Union men's parenting program in the UK that meets in a pub! They're not doing the traditional things anymore. We have to do things differently."

"It's a challenge. Many young people are not joiners. Historically we got our membership from the congregation, but that's not so anymore."

While the group is trying to change with the times, there are still some traditions they hold onto. One happens on March 25 - Lady Day, the celebration of the Feast of the Annunciation. Money is collected from members and sent to headquarters for distribution to overseas funds. This is one of the few times the Mothers' Union fundraises.

"Mothering Sunday is big historically. People in England would go to their mother church," said Kathleen. Held halfway through Lent, Mothering Sunday this year was on March 26. Simnel

cake — a fruit cake with almond icing is baked and served to the congregation. Usually members will participate in the service.

Kathleen has no doubt that Mothers' Union changes lives. She points to her own, but also to the many women in developing countries who have

benefitted from literacy training and the communal support of parenting programs to enhance and uplift families.

Her time at international Mothers' Union events certainly bolsters that belief.

"You meet mothers from so many other cultures and see that we all have the same beliefs and values," she said. "Some don't even speak English. But even with the language barrier, the ethos is the same. It's a most amazing society."

Kathleen was appointed one of the two Zone B Regional Trainers for the Parenting Program. She and the other trainer, Lena Edmondson from Guyana, will travel to Papua New Guinea in 2018 to train facilitators.

What an eye opener it was for me! She spoke on how young women and the vulnerable are targets and how the people who prey on them are very good at brain washing. Saturday afternoon was spent in service to people who are in need and centred around two projects. The first one involved adding personal notes of encouragement to new brassieres that would be distributed to victims of human trafficking. This was a joint effort with the ECW which is the equivalent to our ACW. The other activity was to fill bags with toiletry items for people who would be appearing in court.

Saturday evening was devoted to hearing reports from conference guests. The work being done is

amazing! MU USA has branches in Florida, New York, New Jersey, Georgia, Virginia, Maryland and Massachusetts. Just like here in Canada, they are very

Sunday was tour day. First we attended the morning service at the Washington National Cathedral, with all of the traditional pomp and ceremony. We then toured the city, seeing the Martin Luther King statue, the War Memorial, Abraham Lincoln statue, and the Vietnam Memorial Wall. We visited the newest Smithsonian museum, The National Museum of African American History and Culture, which opened in 2016. We had an afternoon reception at the Virginia Theological Seminary which is where the Rev. Kim had studied. The garden there features a statue of

The information and discussions on the topic of race at the Monday afternoon workshops were enlightening. I think we have similar issues in Canada, only in different forms. We discussed various terms and what they meant to us; it was easy to observe that certain words were internalized differently among the participants. The sculpture of Elizabeth and Mary was created with the women representing the black race. We discussed our observations and were then assigned the task of creating a collage reflecting on how the conference so far had impacted us. We worked both individually and in groups. The final workshop I attended was a continuation on the issue of racism. We explored topics of colour and heard personal testimonies. Also, a wonderful video clip was shown, just to confirm much

The day ended with a beautiful banquet where everyone was dressed in their best! They had a photo booth set up and many crazy poses were taken. I even have a photo with pink hair!

The conference ended at noon on Tuesday but Doreen and I left early to catch our flight back to Canada. The part I did get to hear was about reflecting on your own life and who or what made an impact on you. How can you take that into the world today and make your mark?

Mothers' Union in Barbados! MULOA - Mothers' Union Listening, Observing, Acting

In March 2017, Mothers' Union Worldwide Trustees and Provincial Presidents from around the world met at An Grianan in Termonfeckin, Ireland to discuss how to co-create the vision of Mothers' Union beyond 2020. Alice Kennedy (Diocese of Fredericton, Hampton Branch) attended this meeting in her role as Canadian Mothers' Union Provincial President. There was unanimous agreement to roll out this process to all worldwide members; a series of regional/zone meetings was consequently planned to reach this goal. These meetings would allow Mothers' Union leaders to come together for a series of workshops focusing on how to become equipped with skills to listen and to gather information from members and the communities in which they work. The goal was to mobilize Mothers' Union worldwide.

The initial pilot meeting was held September 10-14, 2017 in the Barbados, West Indies with 28 Mothers' Union members from Zone B in attendance. Zone B includes members from the Americas – North, Central and South America and the Caribbean. Those in attendance at this meeting hailed from Canada, Argentina, Peru, Guyana, Anguilla, Trinidad and Tobago, Barba-

dos, Bahamas and Jamaica. Each diocese sent two representatives. There were also two members from the Solomon Islands and South Korea (as observers in order to facilitate the workshop in their respective countries).

The workshop was planned by the Head of Development and Policy, Nicola Lawrence (Mothers' Union headquarters - Mary Sumner House), and Sheran Harper (Mothers' Union Trustee from Guyana). Cathy James (external consul-

tant) facilitated the four-day

workshop, assisted by Kathleen Snow, (Diocese of Fredericton) Zone B Regional Parenting Trainer and Facilitator. The goal of the MULOA process was to answer three core questions:

 WHO - Whose lives are we touching (and could we be touching)
WHAT - What difference are we making (and could we be making) in people's lives

3. **HOW** - How do we become equipped to listen to the people we serve

Four full days were spent immersed in participatory activities involving Bible studies, large and small group discussions listening to God and to each other. We learned to listen with our head (to facts and ideas), to the heart (through feelings and emotions), and to the feet (by motivation and intentions). The Bible study about Blind Bartimaeus was a powerful lesson in change. Time was also spent on prayer and fellowship with amazing women, making instant friends as we worked at answering the three core questions.

At the end of the workshop we developed a shared understanding of our God-given purpose and how Mothers' Union affects lives around the world. We brainstormed and heard first-hand stories about how to become more effective in making a difference in our church and community. We were challenged to think about who we can currently and potentially partner with, to make a difference in God's world.

Subsequent to the conclusion of all of the regional/zone meetings, MULOA aims to provide worldwide members with resources for a common approach to put our faith into action. This goal will be achieved by supporting and strengthening existing initiatives. Confidence will be built among all members when answers to the three core questions are shared. MULOA will assist in identifying key areas of focus that can demonstrate the impact of Mothers' Union when speaking to supporters, donors, governments and existing members.

At the end of the four-day session, with the aid of many flip chart sheets created and posted around the room, the group summarized and decided on a framework of how to take MULOA forward to their respective Provinces/ Dioceses. The Canadian Mothers' Union has identified the following three priorities and will work with each Diocese and its Branches to:

 Increase awareness of and hold Parenting Program sessions.
Explore partnerships (i.e. within the church and/or community).
Explore ways to nurture and support its branches and members.

Even though the four days involved a lot of thinking and strategizing, our evenings were free for relaxing. Many of us escaped to the meeting room as it was the only room on the college campus that was air conditioned. Most days had a humidex of 46-48 degrees which is far different from the heat to which we are accustomed, during our New Brunswick summers.

A Few Tips on Taking a Good Photo

• Get close to your subjects. They should frame the photo. No sky, no ceiling, no road, no floor!

• Look at what's going on with a creative, fresh eye. What looks interesting?

• Take pix from different angles, looking down on the action, and looking up at the action.

• Take plenty, even of the same thing, so that at least a few are usable. There's always someone blinking!

• Look for people to shoot. Having people in photos is an almost absolute must.

• Candid shots are fine, but if you miss it, ask them to re-do what they just did, ex. serve a piece of pie, kick a ball, shake hands, flip a pancake. Take several of the same shot.

• TIP – it's more flattering to take photos of people when you are above them, like standing on a chair. Shooting from below gives everyone a double chin.

• All photos for the newsletter should be at least 1 MB in size.

• Many camera settings are set so the card holds tens of thousands of images, but that means they're often too small for use in our newsletter.

• Camera settings must be checked to be sure the camera will take the size needed.
