There will be three short programs, one of which will be a presentation by Kathleen Snow about the North. A position was then formed on the Council and Kathleen Snow was invited to be the Representative to the North. This she accepted. The Council held meetings on January 19th and March 23rd. Plans for the Biennial Conference to be held in Halifax on November 7th & 8th 2014 are underway, also plans are being made for the 2016 Canadian Mothers' Union Conference to be held in June 2016. Start saving. Due to inflation, costs are likely to be higher than at previous conferences.

I am very honoured to have been asked to be your president for the next four years, and trust that I will be able, with God's help, to fulfill my duties to the best of my ability. I am so very appreciative of the support and help of the members of the Council, some having previously served on the Canadian Council.



### Niagara Mothers' Union Fall Retreat, November 2012

'Working Together for Justice & Peace, Charity & Advocacy'

Joan Turbitt, a member of Voices for Change-Halton and a participant in the workshop development for the Mothers' Union Fall retreat, shared the goal of moving beyond a charity model of care and exploring how we can seek justice together using the Parable of the Persistent Widow as a starting point for our discussions and reflections.

#### Who is the persistent widow of today?

Anyone who is rendered impoverished or oppressed by the deliberate and systemic disempowerment manipulated by the Government and corporate elites.

## Who is the equivalent of the Judge from whom she sought justice?

Everyone, when it is within their power and indeed when it is their job to make the changes required to prevent conditions of poverty, hunger, homelessness and illness but who choose greed over peoples' needs, or who wilfully maintain their ignorance of the suffering of those around them and do not act.

## What is possible when those who experience injustice organize to seek justice together?

We could bring about realistic change if we had enough allies of like mind.

If we wish to make change to end poverty, then we must vote for candidates who pledge to act and not vote for those who cause poverty to continue and maintain the status quo.

To live the life of the widow is to be willing to challenge injustice where ever it exists in our contemporary situation.'

#### The entire workshop is available in electronic form.
